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


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THE CUB SCOUT PROGRAM

The Cub Scout Program in Finland consists of Pawmarks (Paws) and Steps. There are 37 Paws (=activity collections) to choose from. Each Paw consists of 6–10 Steps (=activities). All Paws have been divided into four (4) different substance sections, that are grounded in Educational Objectives for Cub Scouts. These Educational Objectives have been approved by the Board of The Guides and Scouts of Finland. Every cub scout group completes at least four paws per a calendar year, one from each substance section. Every completed pawmark is a reward badge to the Cub Scouts uniform.

FOR THE FAMILY OF A CUB SCOUT

CUB SCOUT PACK - FIRST STEPS ON THE SCOUTING PATH

Your child is about to take their first steps on the Scouting Path. Activity-packed Cub Pack evenings await them, as well as interesting and imaginative trips and camps. At its best, Scouting as a hobby can provide your child with friends, adventure and experiences for a lifetime. Somewhere along the journey the ideology and goals of Scouting will open up to you and your child, and the child will grow up as a responsible, stable, independent and healthy young person both by mind and deeds.

THERE ARE CUB SCOUTS AND AKELAS IN THE PACK OF CUBS

Cub scouts are the youngest Scouts in the Finnish system of Guiding and Scouting. Cub Scouts are between 7 to 9 years of age. The leader of the Pack, a trained adult, is called Akela. All the Scout leaders are voluntary workers. The Akelas are driven by the will to provide the children with happy, successful experiences. They enjoy encouraging your child to try and achieve things they have never done before, helping the child to reach their own full potential. A pack of cub scouts

will meet weekly. The Pack will also take part in different kinds of weekend camps, trips and scouting competitions. Together these events form the scouting programme, and taking part in these events will help the kid to grow into the goals of the scouting ideology. All the age section goals are introduced in this book. The point of scouting is learning by doing, not by reading and writing. There are also a lot of traditional things in scouting which are not written down, like the left-hand handshake. Kids will learn these things quickly, and the manners will become symbols of togetherness.

PAWS AND STEPS

Your child will do various activities on their scout path, which are called **steps** in the cub scout program. Six steps form a paw - just like in the terrain, as wolf packs follow the same steps, we can only see one paw line. Once a paw is achieved, the cub scout gets a badge to sew on their scout uniform as a sign of new skill learned. The akelas makes sure that the program is diverse, fun and interesting for the children. The cub scout age ends with a transition, after which the scouting path continues in the adventurer's age section.

TRUST

A fully balanced person – the goal of scouting education - grows from a child who values and respects the others and themselves equally. A cub scout works all the time together with other cubs, and that procedure will help them to learn how to acknowledge other people's needs. The guardians will grow along with the kid, too; they'll grow to learn to trust the child and give space to the kid's developing independence. When guardians learn to give independence to the kid, the kid learns how to pack for a weekend trip themselves and how to get help when needed. The guardians will learn to trust that the kid manages on the campsite or elsewhere with other people around. As always in voluntary work, sometimes things don't go as planned. In these cases, feedback from adults to the local scout group helps to improve the work.

IN THE BACKGROUND

Most local scout groups work with a background community, and for about two-thirds the community is a local congregation. For some, it may be a parents' association, YMCA or YWCA, a local Lions organisation, or another. The background community often provides facilities for activities and possibly some financial support for the local scout group. Guardians of cub scouts also have the opportunity to participate in the activities of the local group. The support provided by the guardians to the local group is important, so your help is welcome! It is easy to find interesting things for everyone to do in the local scout group. You can also join scouting as an adult, it is open to everyone. It is an independent and politically non-partisan activity. The scout movement is international: there are scouts in almost every country in the world.

THE ROOTS OF SCOUTING MOVEMENT

The Scouting Movement was established in 1907 by an English gentleman called Robert Baden-Powell; "B-P", as we scouts call him. He gathered about twenty boys from different social backgrounds, and took them camping. The boys worked in small groups, patrols, and their program consisted partly of games and fun, partly of working and learning new skills. B-P's trial camp was a success: the scout movement was born. Scouting and guiding began in Finland in 1910, and the activities were open for both boys and girls from the very beginning.

FUNDING

Scouting is an affordable hobby. The yearly membership fee gives the payee the right to participate in the activities. The membership fee includes a quarterly Partio magazine and a secondary leisure insurance to cover possible damages during a scouting event. The local groups may also collect small membership fees. These funds may be used to purchase the first scout neckerchief and badges. Scouting activities include a lot of outdoor activities, so good rain gear is part of a scout's basic equipment. Excursions can be done in your own regular clothes and rubber boots. However, the smartest school clothes are better

to leave home. If necessary, you should ask your own akela for camping equipment to loan for the first trips.

MORE INFORMATION

More information about scouting in Finland can be found on the site www.partio.fi. The local scout groups inform about their activities on their own websites, by email, or by notes distributed during the weekly meetings. If you have questions about scout-

ing, don't be shy to ask the akela or the local scout group leader. They can give you information about scouting and the happenings in the local group. The interest and encouragement of the home helps the cub scout to be fully involved in the scouting hobby. We akelas do our best to make every cub scout feel comfortable in their pack. You guardians can help us succeed by offering your expertise as well as by asking and giving feedback.



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SCOUTING IS A LIFETIME JOURNEY

Scouting offers age-appropriate programs until the age of 22. After three years as a Cub Scout, the child becomes an Adventurer (10-12 year old scouts). Scouts aged 12-15 are called Trackers and the ones aged 15-17 are called Explorers. The oldest age group is called Rovers (18-22 years old). The scout program for each age is based on age-appropriate educational goals. As the child grows, the activities of the scout program become more challenging, but the most important thing about scouting, working happily together, remains throughout the whole scout program.

SCOUT REGISTER KUKSA

Kuksa is a wooden, Finnish old mug but it is also the name of the electronic register where scout members' information is maintained. In Kuksa you can register for events, edit contact information, print a membership card and search for open invoices, etc. You can also see the activities the child has done.

In addition to the child's information you must also enter the information of at least one guardian in Kuksa. If a guardian has not been added when joining the scouts, the local scout group will do so afterwards. The guardian must have a valid email address where their own guardian membership number will be sent. The guardian can register with Kuksa by using the guardian membership number and the email entered in the system. Underage scouts are always enroled to events using the guardian's ID.

The Kuksa scout register can be found at kuksa.partio.fi. For more information on how to use the system, contact the local scout groups member registry administrator or the cub scouts own akela.

The chairman for the local scout group. In Finnish often shortened LPKJ from the word *lippukunnanjohtaja*

A 7-9 years old scout


Kuksa is the central organisation's membership register program with which you can enrol for the majority of scout events and where the performed activities are listed

Panther play from Senegal

One of the players is chosen as a panther who settles in the middle of their nest in the circle. Other players are given two separate ribbons as tails. At the sound of the whistle, the panther sets out to prey on the tails of other players. When the panther catches the fugitive, the fugitive has to give up one of their tails. When a player has lost both tails, they also become a predatory panther. The last keeper of their tail is the panther in the next play.

Monkey message from Benin

The monkeys had a feast in a large tree growing by the river. The festive food was peanuts. However, the nearest peanut spot was so far away that collecting festive food would go faster for the monkeys if they worked as a chain. However, the hands could not be used by the monkeys to move the nuts, as both hands were needed for climbing from tree to tree. EOUIPMENT FOR THE MESSAGE PLAY: Peas or peanuts, a straw for each player, a small dish (e.g. a plate) for each.

The first player has peas in front of them on a dish (about 5 pieces), which they move to the dish of the second player with the help of the straw and the second player moves the peas on to the third player's dish etc. The team that has gotten all their peas one by one through the chain to the last player's dish is the winner.














scout shirts to school.

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

- Making a fire during a forest fire alert.




